this study examines the long overlooked institution of slavery in korea challenging its erasure from historical narratives and reassessing its role within the country's socio political structure it explores how slavery deeply embedded in a lineage based aristocracy functioned not only as an economic driver but also as a hereditary status system that reinforced elite dominance and self preservation using the concept of servile society a society in which strong asymmetrical dependency is linked to hereditary social status in law and custom the book examines how hereditary dependency shaped elite power governance and social hierarchies over centuries the study combines political and legal history social structures and ideological frameworks to present the latest research on slavery in ancient korea it examines how slaves were constructed as a special species in the korean middle ages analyzes the role of slavery in the yangban dominated society of the early modern period based on political intellectual discourses and statistical data and tracks the expansion of slavery discourses in japanese and western reception after c 1800 based on texts and photographs and examines the aftermath of slavery in the present

how did slavery in america begin gangs of black slaves toiling on large southern plantations dominate many students ideas of african american history although ultimately the reality for most forced immigrants of african descent the institution of slavery was not inevitable in colonial america each of the 5 selections in this volume attempts to show students how slavery emerged how it became the defining condition for african americans in the british colonies and how its development influenced and transformed every aspect of society from colonial law and politics to social relations and cultural values

this collection of essays documents the formative decades of african history across two countries by following the career of a british historian cum archivist paul jenkins born 1938 in sutherland from west africa to central europe it retraces his academic path from ghana to switzerland while engaging his curiosities in contributions to and impact on the development of african history since the 1960s the volume reflects on paul s academic services throughout the 1960s and 1970s mainly at the university of ghana 1965 1972 and subsequently at the basel mission archive and university of basel 1972 2003 in switzerland as key sites where he established himself as a teacher and promoter of african history these episodes led to lasting bonds of intellectual friendships between paul and an array of inter national and generational scholars of africa several of whom are contributing to this volume significantly too the volume highlights the importance of resources paul curated during the early 1970s notably his abstracts of the basel mission s gold coast correspondences through which he increased access to the rich collections of the basel mission archive for scholars of africa altogether the essays celebrate engage interrogate and push beyond paul s numerous past publications and ongoing academic work
